## Minister's Column

This month marks ten years since my ordination in October 2002 in Gardner, MA. I was ordained in my second year of ministry, so I've actually been in ministry eleven years since graduating from Meadville Lombard Theological School in 2001. It's been wonderful to spend eight of those years here with you, in a shared ministry that I think keeps getting stronger and more focused. In the last eight years I've learned and grown a great deal, and I hope you all can say the same thing. Church should be something that stretches and grows your spirits. Of course, that stretching can sometimes be painful, and sometimes we can overextend, but hopefully the usual feeling is that of a good soul-work-out.

In the next few months, the Committee on Ministry, which consists of Marge Duane, Gratia Karmes, Gretchen Marshall, and Ann Green, will begin an evaluation of our shared ministry to share with me and the board. I hope this process will be an opportunity for me to grow and challenge myself even further, even though sometimes that stretching can be painful for me, as well. One thing I've begun this year, in response to comments to the board and the committee on ministry that there is a desire for greater pulpit presence from me, is volunteering to help with worship components on Sundays when I'm not preaching, such as the recent service with Mark Schauer or the service this month with Davi Trusty. Hopefully this will help you to feel like you're getting to see more of me.

Some of stretching and growing is trying new programs and new ideas. A major new program and idea for this year was our sexuality education programs led by Planned Parenthood for teens, younger children, and adults. I recently had the opportunity to tell the Rev. Debra Haffner of the Religious Institute: Faithful Voices on Sexuality and Religion about our program, and she thought it was so innovative that she suggested I write it up for their blog or newsletter. The September classes for the adults and younger children went very well, and we're looking forward to the teen program this month. We know we have fewer teens attending, but we've heard that members of the Columbia High School Gay-Straight Alliance will possibly be joining us for the program. Some of you may know the Heather Albee Scotts who have been visiting our church since moving from Utah two years ago. When we hired Steve Albee Scott in Biology at JCC, we got a double gift in that his wife Heather is a lovely woman who immediately committed herself to leadership in community projects to make Jackson a better place. She has spear-headed the Parkside Media Center Project, an effort to bring much needed renovation and a librarian to Parkside Middle School. The library has fewer than 2000 books (there are 1000 students!) and hasn't had a librarian on staff for 5 years. We can certainly do better than this in Jackson.

On **Saturday, October 6<sup>th</sup>**, from 6-8pm, Parkside and U of M alum Debra Goldstein will be at Parkside for a fundraiser for this project. A \$35 ticket gets you appetizers, the chance to mingle with other education-oriented Jackson-ians, a signed copy of her debut mystery novel *Maze in Blue* (which won an Independent Book Publisher award this year), and the chance to hear her speak at 7pm. What a deal! The author is coming up from Birmingham, Alabama for this event, and a great turnout would really raise awareness of this worthy project. ## Doctrine of Discovery

At the Unitarian Universalist Association General Assembly in June, the delegates voted to formally repudiate the "Doctrine of Discovery." Our resolution read, *"BE IT RESOLVED that we, the delegates of the 2012 General Assembly of the Unitarian Universalist Association, repudiate the Doctrine of Discovery as a relic of colonialism, feudalism, and religious, cultural, and racial biases having no place in the modern day treat-ment of indigenous peoples."* The Doctrine of Discovery is a principle of international law that is woven into our U.S. laws that dates back to the 1500s and is the basis by which the U.S. continues to violate its own treaties with Native Americans.
